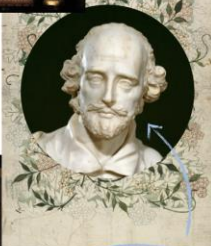
The conversation questions are suggestions only so feel free to ask follow-up questions or different questions on the topic.

My first musical

Two friends, James and Sara, are talking about going to the theatre and seeing a musical in London's West End.

James: Hi Sara! How are you?

Sara: Hi James! I'm good, thanks. How about you?

James: I'm great! Hey, have you ever been to a musical?

Sara: No, I haven't. What's it like?

James: It's like a play, but with singing and dancing. People tell stories through songs. And I was thinking, why don't we go see 'Les Misérables' in London?

Sara: 'Les Misérables'? That sounds fancy. What's it about?

James: It's a really famous musical based on the novel by French author, Victor Hugo. It's about a man named Jean Valjean, who is a former convict looking for redemption after the French revolution. The musical has love stories between other characters too and it's about being good and doing the right thing in the face of danger.

Sara: Wow, that sounds very interesting! When is it?

James: It's next month, on the 15th. A Saturday. What do you think?

Sara: Hmm, let me check my calendar. Oh, I'm free on that day! I'm in!

James: Awesome! The show is playing at the Sondheim Theatre in London. We can get tickets online.

Sara: Online? I'm not good with that. Can you help me?

James: Sure thing! It's easy. We just go to the website, choose the date and seats, and then pay with a card.

Sara: Okay, let's do it together.

They both get their phones out again and go online.

James: Here's the website. See, we click on 'Buy Tickets.'

Sara: Oh, that's simple. Now, which date?

James: The 15th, remember? That's when we're both free.



GLOSSARY:

Fancy (adj.): something special, extravagant or elaborate, for example because it has a lot of decoration.

novel (n): something special, extravagant or elaborate, for example because it has a lot of decoration.

former (adj.): someone who used to be a certain way but no longer is, or something which used to be/belong to a particular thing.

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revolution (n): a change in the way a country is governed, usually to a different political system and often using violence or war

in the face of (ph.v): confronting, dealing with, or enduring a challenging/ difficult situation. Facing or encountering something directly, usually that is difficult or uncomfortable

(v)- verb, (n)- noun, (adj)- adjective, (adv)- adverb, (ph.v)- phrasal verb, (exp)- expression.



Comprehension:
My first musical

Sara: Yes, that's right. Let's select that. And how about the seats?

James: Well, we can choose from different areas in the theatre. There's the stalls, **dress circle**, and **upper circle**. The stalls are closer to the stage but they are more expensive.

Sara: Hmm, let's go for the dress circle. Not too close, not too far. How much are the tickets?

James: The tickets cost £65 each. Is that okay for you?

Sara: Oh wow, that's still quite expensive but I suppose this is a treat because I won't do this very often. Let's do it!

James: Great. Now, we select the number of tickets. Two for us, right?

Sara: Yes, two tickets, please.

James: Perfect. Now, we just need to pay. You put in your card details here.

Sara: Ah, I'm always nervous about this part because I get worried that I'll mess it up.

James: Don't worry, Sara. **Take your time**. I'll guide you **through** it.

After a few minutes, they successfully purchase the tickets.

Sara: We did it! We're going to see Les Misérables!

James: Yes! It's going to be so much fun. I can't wait!

Sara: Me too. But, um, what time is the show?

James: Good question. Let me check... it starts at 7:30 in the evening.

Sara: Perfect! We can have a late lunch, explore London a bit and visit some sights that I haven't been to yet, like Buckingham Palace and Westminster Abbey. Afterwards we can go to the musical.

James: Really? You've never been to Buckingham Palace? We will definitely make sure you get to see it then and the walk to Westminster Abbey from there is also a really lovely one. It's going to be an amazing day.

Sara: I'm very excited, James. Thanks for helping me with the tickets.

James: No problem, Sara. Friends help each other!

Sara: Absolutely. I'm so lucky to have a friend like you.

James: Likewise, Sara. I have to go now but I look forward to the musical and our day out.

Sara: Yes, this will be my first musical, so I can't wait either! So exciting! Bye James.



GLOSSARY:

stalls (n): the area of seats on the ground floor of a theatre nearest to the stage.

dress circle (n): the lowest of the curved rows of seats upstairs in a theatre.

upper circle (n): the seats in a theatre that are above the dress circle, usually the seats furthest away from the stage and the cheapest ones.

stage (n): the area where actors or other entertainers perform in front of an audience

treat (n): something special which you can enjoy, usually something you buy like food or activity

mess it up (ph.v): if you mess something up or if you mess up, you cause something to fail or be ruined.

Take your time (ph.v): to do something without a hurry/ rush, something that can be done slowly

guide through (ph.v): to explain something step by step to someone to help them understand/ do something

I can't wait (exp): an expression used when you're very excited & eager for a particular future event to happen soon.

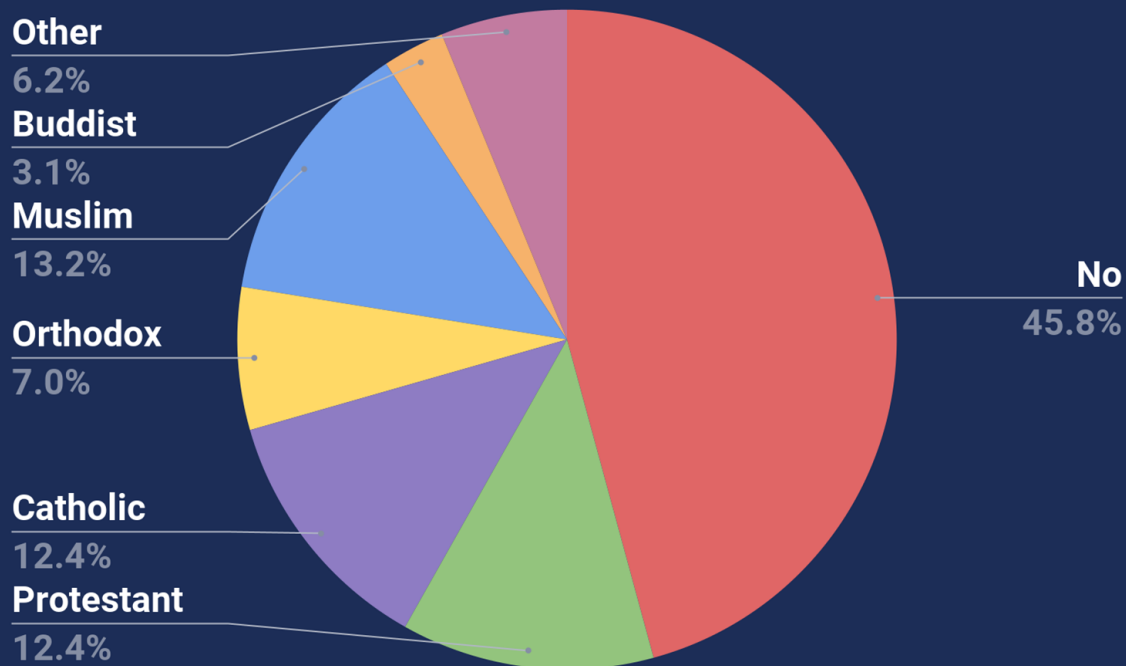
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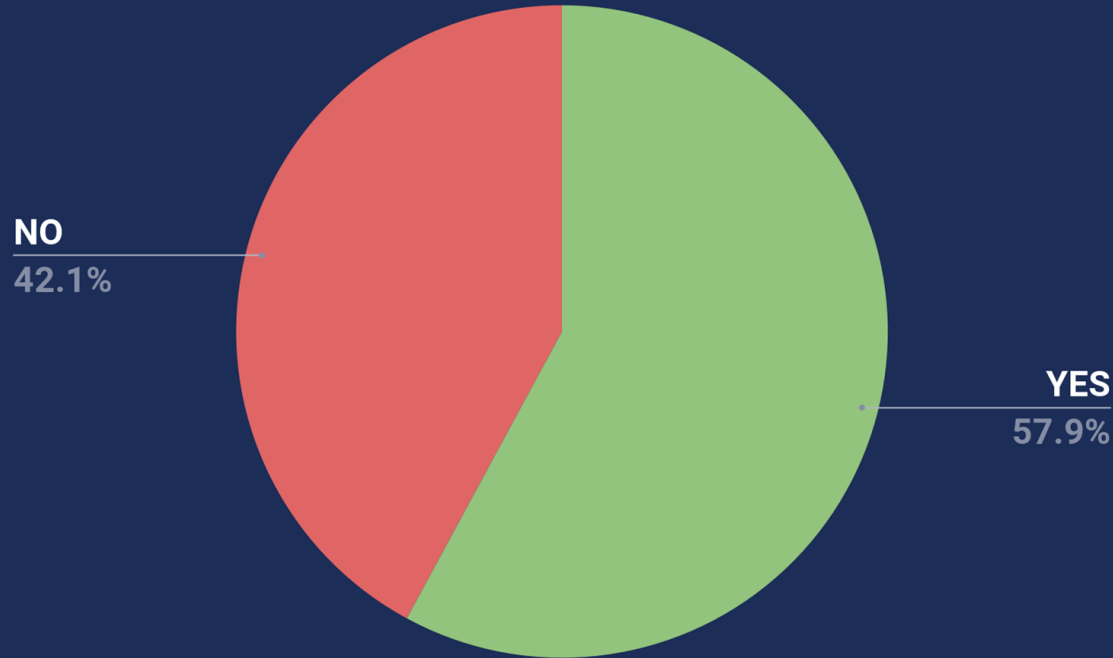

¹⁴ The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us.

We have seen his glory, the glory of the one and only Son, who came from the Father, full of grace and truth.

¹⁵ (John testified concerning him. He cried out, saying, "This is the one I spoke about when I said, "He who comes after me has surpassed me because he was before me."")

Grace: God's undeserved kindness and love, freely given.
Truth: the answer to all our searching.

God shows Himself on earth

Here is the crucial claim:
God became human and moved
into the neighbourhood! (v. 14)

What evidence is given to back this up?

- John (the writer) was one of many who saw the Word first-hand. (v. 14)
- John and his friends saw Him come not in a whirlwind of power and might but full of grace and truth. (v. 14)
- They came to the conclusion that He is God's Son here on earth! (v. 14)
- We also have the public and powerful witness of John the Baptist who says the person he will introduce is his Creator. (v. 15)

These witnesses are saying that the Creator came to live on earth at a specific time, in a specific place. They are saying that they were there when He came, and they want to tell us about Him.

So it's God's Son but what is His name?

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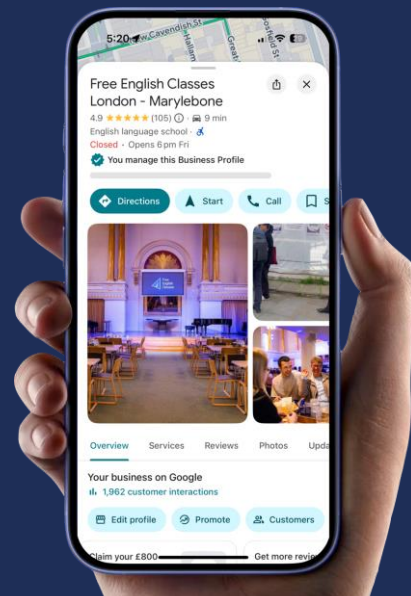
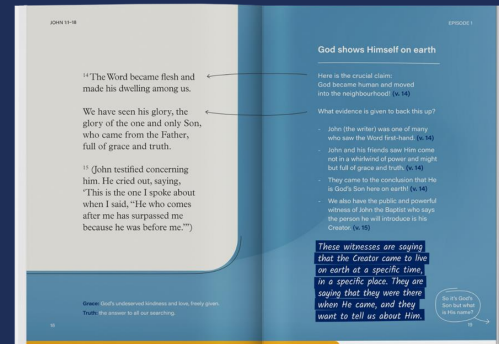
